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Antitrust Statement

This meeting is conducted in accordance with the NRMCA Antitrust Policy Statement

The National Ready Mixed Concrete Association assigns the highest priority to full compliance with both the letter and the spirit of the antitrust laws. Agreements among competitors that unreasonably limit competition are unlawful under federal and state antitrust laws, and violators are subject to criminal fines and incarceration, civil fines and private treble-damage actions. Even the successful defense of antitrust litigation or an investigation can be very costly and disruptive. It is thus vital that all meetings and activities of the Association be conducted in a manner consistent with the Association's antitrust policy.

Examples of illegal competitor agreements are those that attempt to fix or stabilize prices, to allocate territories or customers, to limit production or sales, or to limit product quality and service competition. Accordingly, it is inherently risky and potentially illegal for competitors to discuss under Association auspices, or elsewhere, the subjects of prices, pricing policies, other terms and conditions of sale, individual company costs (including planned employee compensation), the commercial suitability of individual suppliers or customers, or other factors that might adversely affect competition.

It is important to bear in mind that those in attendance at Association meetings and activities may include competitors, as well as potential competitors. Any discussion of sensitive antitrust subjects with one's competitors should be avoided at all times before, during, and after any Association meeting or other activity. This is particularly important because a future adversary may assert that such discussions were circumstantial evidence of an illegal agreement, when viewed in light of subsequent marketplace developments, even though there was, in fact, no agreement at all.

If at any time during the course of a meeting or other activity, Association staff believes that a sensitive topic under the antitrust laws is being discussed, or is about to be discussed, they will so advise and halt further discussion for the protection of all participants. Member attendees at any meeting or activity should likewise not hesitate to voice any concerns or questions that they may have in this regard.

Adopted by the NRMCA Membership, on April 3, 2006, and reaffirmed by legal counsel on January 19, 2024

Legislative Outlook

The 118th Congress ...

- Divided government
- Partisan acrimony
- Politics-forward environment
- Little meaningful legislation







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Legislative Outlook

Lame Duck ...

- Appropriations thru the end of the fiscal year
- National Defense Authorization Act
- Senate: confirm judicial nominees
- Unlikely but possible additional items:
 - Farm Bill 2024
 - Bipartisan tax bill







UPDATE ON COMMITTEE WORK



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Mass Timber and Material Preferences

BLUF: For the first time in five years, the National Defense Authorization Act has no proposed policies related to mass timber.

Over the years, we've:

- Defeated a proposed mass timber building program at DoD
- Established a sustainable building materials program to preempt the mass timber program
- Defeated another proposed mass timber building program at DoD
- Defeated efforts to modify the sustainable building materials program
- Defeated efforts to mandate education on how to build with mass timber DoD
- Educated Congressional offices on importance of material neutrality





Mass Timber and Material Preferences

How did this happen?

- We started early and got aggressive
 - Requested legislative language to be included in base text House and Senate
 - Scheduled meetings with more than 70 Congressional offices on House and Senate Armed Services Committee
- Continued to leverage Republic Consulting's defense practice
- Congressional offices to Committee:
 - Avoid material wars, insist on material neutrality
- Letters, texts and calls from NRMCA members, state associations
- Deployed the Congressional Dashboard to demonstrate industry footprint in Congressional districts
- Forced the conversation and made the issue a headache




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
Mass Timber and Material Preferences

Advocates for mass timber and innovative wood products are not going away

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Mass Timber and Material Preferences

S. 4149 - Mass Timber Federal Building Act

- Sens. Jeff Merkley (D-OR), Jim Risch (R-ID), Ron Wyden (D-OR), Mike Crapo (R-ID)
- Creates a federal preference for mass timber buildings when GSA is building, leasing or buying a structure
- Positioned by Sen. Risch and Sen Crapo team as a forest management policy

H.R. 8790 - Fix Our Forests Act

- Includes R&D program to evaluate opportunities for wildfire resistant structures through "different affordable building materials, including mass timber."
- Opportunities for concrete material neutral program



Mass Timber and Material Preferences

S. 2991 - America's Revegetation and Carbon Sequestration Act of 2023

- Introduced by Sen. Joe Machin (I-WV)
- Provides for practical research for architects, developers and forest products industry
- Develop and facilitate the adoption of curriculum for building structures with mass timber
- Technical assistance to states in designing wood bridges
- Database accounting for carbon stored in federal buildings
 - Opportunity for concrete and full lifecycle thinking
- Construction of not fewer than 100 single occupancy restrooms using mass timber
- Publish an estimate of carbon stored in building materials and forest products
 - Opportunity for full lifecycle thinking





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Mass Timber and Material Preferences

Fighting back ...

- Met with OR and ID offices to share concerns and opposition
- Coordinated opposition from NRMCA members and steel associations
- Worked with Energy and Natural Resources Committee staff to secure modifications to S. 2991

And going on the offensive

- Comprehensive review of existing provisions in law that may allow for a preference for mass timber or innovative wood products
- Identify relevant authorizing bills and assess approaches to modify
- Provisions to codify policy of material neutrality
- Force discussion of full lifecycle thinking





Mass Timber and Material Preferences

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Material neutrality.—The Committee supports the FHWA's work to promote research, development, and deployment of building solutions that advance the performance, sustainability, reliability, and resiliency of building materials. The Committee encourages the Department to support material neutral decisions that do not promote or provide preference for specific building materials. The Committee believes that Federal resources are best utilized when all materials are considered on their own merits, allowing for the best solutions to address our infrastructure challenges.

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Concrete and Asphalt Innovation Act

Research Programs

- Grants to federal and some private entities for six focus areas

State DOT Grant Program

- Voluntary grant programs for states to adopt performance specifications

Advance Market Commitments

- Three year advance purchase commitments to incentivize investment in and development of low emissions concrete and asphalt products

CAIA in the 118th and 119th Congress

- Garnered additional cosponsors
- Will not be considered in the 118th Congress
- Significant revisions in 119th Congress





IMPACT Act and IMPACT 2.0 Act

IMPACT Act

- Modified R&D provisions of CAIA
- Passed out of Committee and passed the House on suspension
- NRMCA, PCA and other organizations provided letters of support

IMPACT 2.0

- Transportation provisions of CAIA
 - Voluntary grant programs
 - Advance market commitments
- Introduced and referred to Transportation and Infrastructure Committee
- Will not be considered in 118th Congress



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Additional Work in the 118th Congress

Buy America in WRDA/FAA

- Joint outreach to Committees on implementation consistent with IIJA

Building codes hearing at T&I

- Lead comments on behalf of NRMCA, PCA, NSSGA and NAMIC

Disaster Savings and Resilient Construction Act

- Outreach to potential new sponsors; primary sponsor Rep Pascrell passed away

Opposition to GHG Rule

- Partnered with coalition to promote repeal of GHG emissions measures for states





Big Ticket Items for the 119th Congress

Highway Bill/Surface Reauthorization

- Existing authorization expires September 2026

Tax Extensions/Reforms

- Dependent on outcome of elections
- Host of important tax provisions of the TCJA expiring
- Bipartisan interest in getting this done

Farm Bill Reauthorization

- Expired September 2023, extended

Fly Ash Reclamation Study

- EPA Smart Sectors released preliminary results of study on fly-ash

Performance Specifications

- Provision from Concrete and Asphalt Innovation Act providing grants to states to adopt performance specifications



























Wild Cards
